

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INSTRUCTIONS



This is the true pattern for cutting snowflakes. But snowflakes aren't the only patterns unique to this fold-and-cut technique. Your only limit on the designs is your own imagination. Whether this is a snowflake, stars, bears, hearts or any of the patterns in this book, you can create your own variations and sizes. Decorate and transform any area into a whimsical fantasy.

 Begin by cutting your 8¹/₂ x 11-inch paper into a square 8¹/₂ x 8¹/₂-inch. Make a larger square if you want to cut a larger image (Figure A).

Fold corner A down to corner D to form a triangle (Figure B). Cut the strip at the bottom of the triangle off. Remember you can enlarge the pattern you want to use.

- 3. Fold corner B down to corner C to form a smaller triangle (Figure C).
- 4. Your triangle should look like Figure D.
 - . Now the tricky part is to fold this triangle into three equal parts. Begin by folding the right corner over to the left but do not make a crease yet. Corner D will be below the edge (Figure E).
- 6. Fold the left corner gently to the right. When you have formed three equal parts, crease the folds firmly. Turn your triangle over and see that you have two little triangles at the bottom of your fold. Trim off the two little triangles (Figure F).
- 7. Put a small amount of tape on the sides of your folded paper that will be cut away. Tape your cutout pattern in place or pencil in the pattern on your folded triangle. This **true pattern for snowflakes** is now ready to cut (Figure G).
- 8. Start with the point of your triangle facing down and with the three folds in your left hand. Cut away the smaller parts of your pattern first, working your way up to the larger cuts. The lighter weight the paper the easier it is to cut. Use your imagination and creativity (Figure H).


